# A Lifelong Commitment to Hospice Care

A conversation with Dr. Joseph Pino

r. Joseph Pino's journey into hospice and palliative care started long before he even knew it. Losing his mother to cancer at the age of 14 shaped the way he saw life and, eventually, medicine. If you ask him, he'll tell you that back then, there were no hospice services or support groups ... just loss. That experience stuck with him and became a driving force behind his work today.

When he moved to Florida to open his family medicine practice, he quickly saw the need for more geriatric care. Gulfside Hospice was just starting, and back then Dr. Pino said they were using an actual house as an inpatient hospice unit. He made it a priority to follow his patients wherever they needed care - at home, in nursing facilities, and at Gulfside hospice home. Over time, his practice naturally shifted toward geriatric and end-of-life care, and later in Hospice and Palliative Medicine, leading him to become board-certified in geriatric medicine in 1994.

Over time, Dr. Pino looked for opportunities to leave a lasting impact on the hospice community. When he learned about Gulfside's plans to expand and open a new hospice center in New Port Richey, he was thrilled. "The old one lacked capacity and was dated and I thought the area needed a new hospice center," he says.

As Gulfside's expansion was underway, Dr. Pino wanted to be involved in improving the setup – making it the comfortable and peaceful sanctuary for those who will need it, when that time comes. He took the opportunity

to make a capital campaign donation in memory of his mother. He decided to honor his mother by naming something in the new center in her honor. He chose the garden fountain because he feels that the peace and serenity of the moving water will offer solace to patients and their visitors. He said although his mother would have been honored to have the fountain named for her, she likely would have wanted the fountain to be named for her family and not just for her.

"To do this for the community and to honor my mother is truly a blessing," he says. Once completed, the new garden will bear the name "The Pino Family."

While leaving a legacy through this donation was important, Dr. Pino's biggest impact continues to be on training the next generation of hospice and palliative care physicians. Through the fellowship program, which he partners with Gulfside Hospice, he ensures that compassionate, patient-centered care will continue for years to come. The fellowship program he leads is affiliated with the graduate medical education programs of HCA (Hospital Corporation of America) and is located at HCA Bayonet Point Hospital. Dr. Pino, the faculty, and the Fellows and Residents that train there are all part of HCA's graduate medical education programs.

# Q & A with Dr. Joseph Pino

How does the fellowship program work?

**Dr. Pino:** The program is accredited by the ACGME (American Council for Graduate Medical Education)

and through this process it is determined how many fellows we will have in the program. Right now, we train two per year, but I'm pushing to expand that to three. We also have two fellows in our Geriatric fellowship at Oak Hill hospital in Brooksville. Fellows complete at least 25 home visits during their fellowship. My preference is for them to do those visits with Gulfside because most hospice patients are cared for at home. They need to see that firsthand.

## **How does Gulfside Hospice support your program?**

**Dr. Pino:** One of the key ways my team works together with Gulfside is through hospital-based hospice care. If a patient in the hospital is at the end of life but too unstable to transfer to an inpatient unit, we convert their hospital bed into a hospice bed. My team takes over their care right then and there, handling everything, including terminal extubation if necessary. It allows patients to receive hospice support without having to move, and it's a vital part of our training program ... actually a requirement for their learning. Before we could even start this program, we needed a committed hospice to work with, and your CEO Linda Ward, and her team stepped up. Gulfside has been an incredible partner.

#### What do you want your fellows to learn from your practice?

**Dr. Pino:** Well, you can't learn compassion. They have to have that and they can't learn empathy so when I pick them, I try to pick people with sincerity. If they had that quality, they would be good physicians, number one, and excellent palliative care physicians but we teach them to respect patient autonomy and that families and the patient are one unit. We teach them that we don't make the decisions, we present them with the facts and the family has to make that decision. We teach them patience and tolerance.

Hospice and palliative care are all about education. People hear





"hospice" and think it means giving up, but that's not true. The earlier a patient comes to hospice, the more it helps. That's why it's so important that we educate both doctors and the public on what hospice really is.

# How does your support help improve hospice care?

**Dr. Pino:** I want to make sure that there are resources in the community so families that are impacted by cancer, specifically families with children, will have a resource in the community that they can go to for help, for counseling. Gulfside provides resources that simply weren't available when I was young, and I want to make sure those services continue to grow.

Those of us in palliative care need to educate our fellow physicians and the community so that patients and their families will have a better understanding of palliative care and end of life care. They are not always the same. Patients with chronic illness can have palliative care with the goal of living comfortably and for as long as possible.

Dr. Pino is a Board certified in Family Medicine, Geriatrics and Hospice and Palliative Medicine and a Fellow of the American Academy of Hospice and Palliative Medicine. He is an Assistant Clinical Professor HCA Healthcare/ USF Morsani College of Medicine.
